





Planting with LEAF




We planted 1,176 native trees and shrubs through the Backyard Tree Planting Program with over 470 property owners.



WE PLANTED IN...

In just five months, we planted over **260** native trees and shrubs with more than **130** Durham property owners.



WE EXPANDED IN DURHAM REGION

Following continued success in Ajax, our Backyard Tree Planting Program expanded to Oshawa, Pickering, Scugog and Whitby in July. We distributed **595** trees through our Spring Tree Sale to Toronto, York Region and Ajax property owners.



THE SPRING TREE SALE

Property owners purchased small trees (2 to 3 feet in height) from us through an online sale. The trees were distributed through contactless delivery by our staff in June 2020.

We increased habitat even more by distributing **73** Native Garden Kits.





GARDEN KITS

Butterfly Kit • Songbird Kit • Native Bee Kit • Shade Thriving Kit Small/Large Yard Options

We helped residents create wildlife-friendly urban yards through campaigns that educate individuals on the benefits of native species and direct back to the Backyard Tree Planting Program: Backyard Biodiversity, Bees Love Trees and Project Swallowtail.



PROJECT SWALLOWTAIL

We partnered with Project Swallowtail to increase pollinator awareness and habitat in west Toronto. Project participants could choose between 14 natives trees and shrubs that provide food and/or shelter to swallowtail butterflies and other pollinators.

THE TORONTO COMMUNITY HOUSING (TCH) PLANTING AND STEWARDSHIP INITIATIVE aims to increase urban forest canopy cover and achieve environmental and quality of life benefits for TCH tenants by planting trees and engaging the local community in their stewardship.

- 48 new trees
- 247 native shrubs

- **19** sites
- 10 tenant-led Tree Care Teams



We distributed over **500** free, native shrubs in Toronto to promote planting native species on private property!

Requests were made online and contactless deliveries were completed by our staff in September.

Volunteering with LEAF

LEAF volunteers participated in planting and stewardship events, cared for the Urban Forest Demonstration Gardens, raised awareness online and much more! 2020 highlights:

- 6 volunteer orientation sessions attended by 260 people
- 341 active volunteers

- 3,225 total volunteer hours
- 4 community outreach events (pre-COVID-19)





SOCIAL MEDIA OUTREACH VOLUNTEERS

COVID-19 limited our ability to connect with community members face-to-face. In response, we launched the Social Media Outreach Team to engage the public in urban forest issues. This team of specially trained LEAF volunteers engaged with over **660** people this year using social media.

LEAF staff and volunteers dedicated over 360 hours to planting over 1,600 native trees and shrubs on public lands in Richmond Hill.





RESPONSE TO COVID-19:

Typically, our events are open to the public. This year, to ensure the health and safety of all participants, we limited attendance to LEAF staff and volunteers, and added the following rules:

- 1. Face masks must be worn at all times
- Bring-Your-Own gardening gloves
- 3. Adhere to physical distancing guidelines

The LEAF Learning Garden at Wychwood Barns Park and our five Urban Forest Demonstration Gardens were cared for by 43 volunteer garden stewards.

THE URBAN FOREST DEMONSTRATION GARDENS

Our volunteer garden stewards, following all preventative health guidelines, kept these biodiverse spaces beautiful and inviting all year. We're so happy to have been able to provide our volunteers and the wider community with this safe and meaningful experience during these challenging times.





Learning with LEAF

Tree Tenders Volunteer Training highlights:

- 2 virtual, multi-day courses
- 7 expert instructors
- 94 graduates from Toronto, as well as York, Durham and Peel Regions







Our Young Urban Forest Leaders program was re-imagined to provide five months of virtual training and mentorship to youth:

- 20 youth
- 9 virtual workshops
- 7 guest speakers

- 4 webinars hosted and led by the participants
- 313 webinar attendees





WORKING WITHIN THE COMMUNITY

Over the course of the program, participants assessed and identified priorities for planting and stewardship within their own neighbourhoods and sparked awareness of the urban forest through targeted outreach.

VIRTUAL TREE TOURS

We hosted **2** virtual learning events with over **200** live attendees. The tours were recorded and made available to the public for free and have since been enjoyed by an additional **270** people.

- A picture is share using #LeagueofTrees



- 3. Engaged LEAF staff in reflection and idea generation through an anonymous survey
- 4. Intiated a similar survey with LEAF Board Members and the larger LEAF community

The committee will develop a plan with short, medium and long-term actions in early 2021.

The Reconciliation and Anti-Racism Committee was formed to facilitate anti-racist organizational change and reconcilation work. The committee is a collaborative effort between LEAF staff and Board Members.
