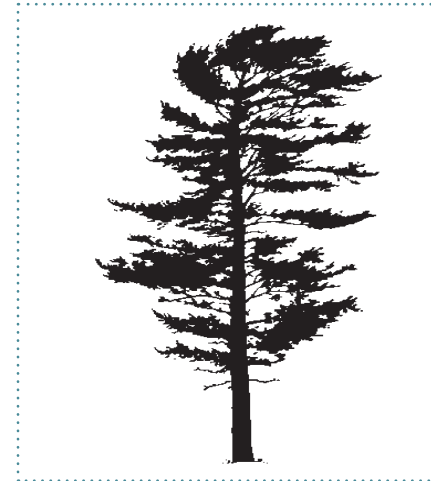

FORM

HEIGHT 50 feet
WIDTH 15 feet

straight trunk with a high canopy and horizontal, upturned branches

LEAF

bundles of five, bluish-green, long, flexible evergreen needles; new foliage emerges in spring

FALL COLOUR

none (evergreen)

BARK

smooth, grey-green when young; thick, scaly, furrowed, reddish-brown when mature

CONES

females mature to long, brown, woody, often curved cones with rounded scales; emerge in early summer, mature in late summer and persist throughout the fall and winter

NEW CONES

small, yellow, cylindrical, male clusters near branch tips and small, light green with a tinge of red, female clusters at ends of branches
